THE PROCESS

Information Gathering Sessions

The Visioning Process began with gathering information from church leaders and members of Rockville United Church (RUC) during three Zoom sessions held October 22 – 24, 2020. A total of 50 leaders and members including Rev. Scott Winnette and Pastor Jennifer Knutsen, participated across the three sessions. Additionally, members who could not join a live session could respond by email; four members did so.

Each information session began with Jill White, Regional Mission Interpreter, UCC Church Building & Loan Fund, discussing the importance of knowing the church's why – knowing what they were doing to deploy their assets for mission and live into God's economy. Following this presentation, Jill divided attendees into small groups of four or five to discuss nine questions addressing vision for the congregation over the next one to five years:

1. What current programs or mission emphases should be enhanced and how?
2. What programs or mission emphases should be added?
3. What current programs or mission emphases should be discontinued?
4. What non-programmatic things could the church do to strengthen and expand its ministry?
5. What improvements, renovations and/or new construction?
6. What resources should the church be providing its members?
7. What resources should the church be providing the wider community?
8. What are the top three needs in your community?
9. What do you believe God might be calling you to do as a congregation?

Development of Mission Priorities

Forty-two RUC members and leaders, including Rev. Scott Winnette and Pastor Jennifer Knutsen, gathered on Saturday, Nov. 7, 2020, for Day 2 of the Visioning Process. The session began with participants in small groups; their task was to identify common themes within the list of compiled question responses. They identified the following themes:

- Care of the earth
- Buildings & Grounds enhancement including environmental, use & availability, greening, garden, playground
- Outreach & Advocacy, including LGBTQ
- Congregational Health & Vitality
 - Care for members – program support, congregational care
 - Care of one another within congregation
 - Internal capacity building
 - Children's & Youth Programs
- Care of others outside of the congregation; local community (geographical) / Community Reach

- Justice ministry / Poor People's Campaign / Racism / Racial Social Justice
- Care outside local community / outward facing programs
- Disaster Response (housing)
- Communication / Technology / Tools for engagement – virtual, building use, enhancing worship experience

After much discussion and wordsmithing, the following mission priorities were agreed upon:

- Care of one another (within congregation)
- Care of community/neighborhood
- Commitment to social justice, anti-racism, and civil rights
- Care of the earth

Next, those gathered broke into five small groups. Each group was assigned the responses from one of the information sessions' questions (i.e., 1, 2, 4, 6, and 7) and categorized each response to one or more of the mission priorities. During the lunch break, Jill sorted all responses into the group-assigned mission priorities and created a list or "ballot" for participants to record their individual votes.

Following lunch, participants were instructed to vote on those items under the four mission categories. Participants could use their 15 votes as desired – more than one vote for a given item or choosing 15 different items upon which to vote. After voting, individuals emailed their ballots to Jill for final tallying.

Review of Voting and Discussion of the Strategic Plan of Implementation

Twenty-seven individuals representing the church council, Strategic Planning Task Force (SPTF), and others that had participated in prior Visioning Process sessions, including Rev. Scott Winnette and Pastor Jennifer Knutsen, attended the final session on Dec. 10, 2021. Jill reviewed her work after the Nov. 7 session, presented the top vote receivers, and led a discussion of them. She also explained the importance of knowing external and internal context and shared information on demographic tools for external analysis, plus ways to perform an internal assessment. Lastly, Jill reviewed the process for drafting the Strategic Plan of Implementation.

THE RESULTS

A summary of votes is in Tables 1-4, one for each mission priority. Within each table, similar actions are grouped together by theme. There is a column with the total votes for each action; for example, in Table 1, the action, Keep virtual platforms *interactive* even when we are back in the building, received seven votes. There also is a column with the sum of all votes for the theme; the playground received 29 votes, as seen in Table 1. The themes are presented in order, from the one receiving the most votes to the one receiving the least. Also, because people could give up to 15 votes for any action, there is a column for the number of people who voted for each action; for example, in Table 1, five people voted for the action: Enhance the children's ministry program by building a playground.

The top three themes, based on total votes, for each priority were as follows:

Mission Priority 1, Care of one another within the congregation

- Continue Zoom meetings and worship; continue social connections made digitally
- Playground
- Congregational care support

Mission Priority 2, Care of community/neighborhood

- Support Community Reach (including Kaseman Clinic) with time and treasure
- Provide safe spaces and other support for LGBTQ youth
- Use buildings and grounds for the benefit of the community

Mission Priority 3, Commitment to social justice, anti-racism, and civil rights

- Poor People's Campaign
- Racial justice, work with Rev. Jennifer
- LGBTQ and Transgender outreach and support

Mission Priority 4, Care of the earth

- Green Church
- Expand community use of and benefit from our garden
- Garden ministry/elder/committee
